

# Triad Economic development group names new key executive

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Following a nationwide search, Greater Winston-Salem Inc. has found its latest executive not far from home. [The organization, a merger of the former Winston-Salem Chamber of Commerce and Winston-Salem Business Inc.](#), has named [Laura Johnson Lee](#) as senior vice president of economic development.

Lee will lead a division responsible for recruiting new business and industry, developing new businesses and supporting existing businesses' retention and expansion needs.

A graduate of Wake Forest University, Lee returns to Winston-Salem from Raleigh, where she served as business recruitment manager for the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina. There, she was responsible for attracting new business into North Carolina markets, including the Triad. As EDPNC's only industry-specific recruiter, her projects focused on food and beverage processing and value-added agriculture. She was successful in helping attract more than 2,400 jobs and \$365 million in capital investment.

A native North Carolinian, she grew up in Wilson. She earned an undergraduate degree in communications and entrepreneurship and a masters of science in management at Wake Forest.
